Transition

Review meetings

Review meetings are held for children on our SEND register (SEND support), three times a year (approx. November, March and June/July). These will be held with your child's class teacher and the SENCo (Mrs Haley). These are an opportunity to discuss progress alongside any concerns you may have. These meetings last approx 20 minutes and are combined with the meeting you would normally have at parent/carers' evening. Children on our SEND monitoring list however, will only be discussed at parent/carers' evening. Please do not hesitate to get in touch with if you have any concerns outside of these times in the first instance.

Transitions, whether they are between year groups, key stages or schools, can be a stressful time for children as they get used to new routines, new adults, new friends and new surroundings. This is the case for all children and for children with special educational needs the changes can be even more unsettling. As a parent or carer you can help. Having conversations with your child and finding out how they feel about the transition is a great way to start.

Ask them:

- What they are looking forward to?
- What they will miss about their old school or class?
- What they enjoy doing and what they find difficult?



These are all ways of helping your child get ready and make the best possible transition. Here at St Wilfrid's, we try our upmost to make these transitions as smooth as possible. For children with SEN, in addition to the standard session where they meet their new teacher, we also create booklets, do social stories, have 1:1 meetings with pupils and their new teacher, and arrange multiple visits to their new class.

As staff, we also have in depth transition discussions between the former teacher and new teacher to ensure that important information regarding needs is carried over to the next year.

For identified year 6 pupils with SEND, we will be liaising with their secondary school and children are likely to have additional visits to support transition.
